



CREATING A PREPAREDNESS PLAN FOR SPRING WEATHER

In the event that your company experiences a loss from severe spring weather, use the following checklist to help manage the situation and minimize business interruption:

 EVALUATE YOUR COMPANY'S RISKS Review the company's flood zones, tornado risks, storm damage insurance and flood/surge limits. Pay attention to the news for weather updates.
 CREATE A COMMUNICATIONS PLAN WITH AN EMERGENCY WARNING NOTIFICATION SYSTEM Develop a system for knowing who is in the building in the event of an emergency. Appoint a primary contact and team leaders who will communicate with and direct people in the facility. Decide how the team will stay in contact and communicate information during the event.
 KNOW YOUR FACILITIES' CAPABILITIES Know where your utility shut-offs are located. Know your power requirements and test emergency power. If you company does not have a generator, consider buying one.
 HAVE SAFE ROOM AND EVACUATION PLANS Determine where your tornado safe rooms are located. Create an evacuation plan. Have emergency supplies ready. Facility protection supplies, hygiene supplies, first aid supplies, food & water, basic tools, and safety apparel. Practice your plan for each type of event. Severe flood, tornado, power outage etc.
 BE AWARE OF BUSINESS CONTINUITY Plan an off-site back up of critical files and other data if not already using a cloud service for this. Consider what options are available for alternate workspace or production. Consider what short term outsourcing possibilities exist for your clients or customers if a major disaster occurs that will make the location operational.
 REDUCE STORM DAMAGE AT YOUR PROPERTY Keep trees, branches and bushes trimmed year-round. They could fall on personnel, the building, walls, roof or power lines during severe weather. Inspect and repair loose or damage building components. Pipes, gutters, siding, shingles, roof, soffit, fascia, brickwork and chimneys.
